My AML Journey

from the Deacon

We had gone home for the weekend, Michael wanted to mow the grass and pick up Peaches so he could give her a bath. We decided to keep Peaches for the weekend and drop her off at my brother's late Sunday afternoon on our way back to Vanderbilt University Hospital. Peaches was thrilled to be home with us, she never left my side, if I laid down she would lay beside me also. I wish we could have taken her with us but no pets were allowed at the Village Apartments.

We arrived at the apartment around 7:30, we decided to stop and eat at Cracker Barrel in Clarks-ville on the way home to the apartment. Michael decided to go to Kroger to get what groceries we needed for the week. While he was gone I filled my weekly pill box with my medicines and decided to do my daily walk in the hallway. I finished my eight rounds and had just entered the apartment when Michael arrived with the groceries.

I was feeling tired so I went to bed at 9:00pm, my appointment wasn't scheduled until 10:00am Monday morning. I woke up several times to go to the bathroom, I had drank one liter of water plus a can of sprite. Seven o'clock came pretty fast for me. I got up and did my morning prayers and reading while waiting for Michael to get up. Michael had gotten up at eight o'clock and fixed our breakfast, while he cleaned the kitchen and dishes I took my shower. We left at 9:45 walking down to the clinic.

It was a pretty day for a walk and we arrived in plenty of time for my appointment. I did my usual check in, we were assigned to room five. The nurse came in to do my vitals, the aid was on vacation, every thing checked was Ok. We saw Dr. Jananai at 11:00 and left for the apartment.

Tuesday I had my physical therapy appointment at 1:00pm. We walked down to the center for my physical therapy. Sharon was my physical therapist, we got started as soon as I signed in at the desk. I had done my leg lifts on three different machines. I continued with my arm lifts, but when I started with my chest exercise, I noticed feeling a little light headed. The next thing I remember was waking up laying on the floor. Sharon and several others looking down at me asking if I was Ok?

I was put on a gurney, loaded into an ambulance and taken to the ER at Vanderbilt. I was taken straight to a room and checked by one of my transplant team doctors. I had to spend the night in the hospital because my blood pressure was low. I was dismissed from the hospital the next morning. I was told not to do my physical therapy for Thursday, but I did continue my evening walks. The following week I was scheduled to come once a month so I got

to go home for good on April 28th. As you all know I am still on my AML journey, the transplant is not a cure, but thanks be to God! I am still in remission and living one day at a time.

blessed Caitlin and Avery's new home after the 10 a.m. service where Fr. Rich was our supply priest. Then 18




of the well-wishers adjourned to Rockhouse on the



Thanks to our youth and their parents who participated in CleanUp Day on Saturday September 21, and to Mitch and Kelly Deep for feeding us!






Youth Sundays. This year we welcomed first time participants John Tyler Caudill, who acolyted for the first time and he and his brother Chandler Caudill who read the suf-

The deadline for applying for the Kohler Family Scholarship for winter/spring semester is November 1. You may recall our youth were able to attend the triennial Episcopal Youth

Event in Baltimore thanks to St. Paul's, Marty White and the Diocese of Lexington. Cindy Sigmon, the Youth Missioner/Camp Program director from the Diocese of Lexington remembers St. Paul's and how our youth long to be involved in the larger world of the Episcopal Church. Cindy has reached out to let us know of the Province IV Youth Ministries Leadership & Network Meeting that will take place at Camp McDowell in the Diocese of Alabama from December 5-8. Province IV consists of the 20 Southeastern US dioceses and, with strong leadership, is recognized as a leader in the Episcopal Church. This annual gathering provides the chance for sharing our successes, our challenges and our ideas to help shape the future. It provides an opportunity to listen to one another, to develop ministry opportunities and to have fun together. Two to three young people who are leaders and two adult sponsors from each diocese are invited to attend.

Could these young people be from St. Paul's? Could a chaperone or both be from St. Paul's? The registration deadline is October 21 so if you or your youth are interested, please talk with me as soon as possible so we don't miss this opportunity. Camp McDowell is about an hour from Birmingham.

There is a kicker, though. This leadership opportunity takes place over the weekend that is the Henderson Christmas parade.
