AML, Not an Easy Journey

from the Deacon

The clinic was busy! I signed in at the reception desk, received my arm band and weighed myself on the scale. We were placed in room 13, I thought well this isn't going to be good! I was still feeling nausea from eating breakfast. The aide came right in to take my vitals, my blood pressure was high but no fever. I told her I was experiencing nausea from eating my breakfast. She typed on the key pad I was having nausea this morning and told us she would let the nurse know, as she left the room.

Immediately, my nurse Sandy came into the room asking how bad the nausea was? She brought with her several packages as well. Sandy said she would draw the blood first and then take off my bandage to clean around my Tri-port. That's what all the packages were for. She left the room to send my blood work to the lab. When she returned, she had three bags of magnesium for me! My magnesium had dropped too low according to the lab test done earlier. It would take three hours for the infusion of the magnesium before we could leave. So Michael and I ordered chicken salad sandwiches for lunch. The sandwiches came with a bag of baked chips, one fruit cup and cookies.

It was about thirty minutes later and I began to get nauseated. I had two more bags of magnesium to finish. Before I could call the nurse my lunch had exited my stomach and onto the floor! Michael left to get the nurse, but she was at the doorway before he knew it. Sandy heard my vomiting and brought something to put in my IV. We changed rooms so the mess I made could be cleaned up. The smell was terrible! I apologized for making such a mess but no need things like that happened all the time.

Dr. Kassim finally arrived to check on me. He looked at Michael and asked, "Do you cleanup his mess very often?" I replied, "No, because this is the first time I've gotten sick!" And I feel much better now! Where's a doctor when you need one! Dr. Kassim just laughed and said, wonderful! Larry is doing Ok! Dr. Kassim continued to chat with Michael while he examined me. Asking Michael if I had been sick before or if he thought the nausea was getting worse. Michael told him I was taking the pills for nausea at home only when I needed to. As Dr. Kassim left, he told me he would see me tomorrow.

It was 3:20 pm that afternoon when I finished the magnesium infusion. Once the nurse had me disconnected from the IV, we were free to go. I actually felt better walking home this time even though I was using my walker for assistance. The sun was still shining as we walked back to the apartment. We stopped at the mail box, but no mail. Glad this day is just about over. Day Five next month.
