It's just that simple.

Ambient Conditions

For 30 minutes, do as many rounds as possible of:

- · 12 burpees
- · 24 pull ups
- · 36 lunges
- · 400 meters running

The above is a recipe for a workout I was assigned shortly after arriving in Henderson, Kentucky. It is not dissimilar to another workout recipe I might have been assigned shortly before that in El Paso, Texas. Similar effort, similar challenge, similar workload. Nothing all that different, or surprising, or out of the ordinary.

So how come I felt like I was dying in Henderson when I would have felt just fine in El Paso?

The answer is simple, though it took me a couple weeks to work it out because I just wasn't expecting it to have such a huge impact. The answer was the weather. In El Paso, I would have been doing that workout in an air conditioned gym with a relative humidity of maybe 20% max. In Henderson the gym I've joined doesn't have an air conditioner, so the temperature was over 80° and the humidity over 90% even with the giant overhead door rolled up and all four industrial sized fans at full speed.

The difference wasn't in me, it wasn't in the work, and it wasn't in any of the other extraneous details that I had any control over. The difference was entirely in the ambient conditions, and the impact was huge.

I've recently started reading Life Worth Living: A Guide to What Matters Most by Miroslav Wolf, Matthew Croasmun, and Ryan McAnnally-Linz. It's a fairly recent publication, though the eponymous class upon which the book is based on has been running at Yale University for over ten years. I've read an-

other book that was based on that same class which had a lasting ripple effect on my thoughts so this was an easy choice.

The work of the authors, both in the class and in the book, is to guide us towards answering one of the biggest questions of this human life: what is a life worth living? What matters most? Our religious traditions have answers to these questions, or at least the makings of an answer to these questions, so the work of these authors is interesting to me, and I imagine it might be to you as well.

However, I haven't got to the part of the book where they do this yet. So far they're still just setting conditions, which is what made me think of working out at a gym in Henderson, Kentucky without any AC. They point out, quite rightly I think, that the ambient conditions profoundly affect one's ability to answer these kinds of big questions. The social-media-sphere and influencer-clergy, the advertisingindustrial-complex and its multinational corporate overlords, and just the stories that we tell ourselves constantly about who we are and what matters most in our music, our TV and movies, and all the other forms of entertainment that we use to wile away our

Any answer we might have about what matters most that cuts against the grain of popular culture is going to be harder to hold onto than it otherwise would be. The ambient conditions just make it more difficult, even if we are otherwise committed to it. And Jesus' answer to what matters most definitely cuts against the grain of popular culture. Cuts against it so directly that there are entire denominations of American Christianity that seem to be solely an effort to reconcile Jesus to a more comfortable and popular culturally appropriate format.

That's why we train, though, isn't it? So that when ambient conditions are adverse, we can still persevere, even if it does feel harder. So I'll say again that it's an honor to be training with you here in Henderson. See you in the gym church!

August Vestry Minutes Summary

- Financials were discussed. The treasurer's report included a handout concerning pledges and the trust highlights. There was a discussion that there needs to be a push for pledges for next year, and it was discussed when to start and also the timing of stewardship. It was suggested that a letter of enthusiasm be sent out before the stewardship campaign.
- The Bishop's visit and confirmation will be Sunday, November 9. There will be a weekday visit by the bishop in 2026 prior to lent for the celebration of new ministry and a Deanery event.
- Fr. Ben gave the Vestry dates when he would be out of town.
- Fr. Ben shared upcoming plans to work on the communication systems, continue to refine the bulletin and liturgy systems, a plan for a ministry training and possibly a plan for fall adult formation.
- An estimate was submitted for repair of the HVAC system. Also a list was shared of all that has been done to the building and grounds in the last month.
- Miranda reported that the All Saints alumni weekend will be August 29 31. There are approximately 12 people from St. Paul's attending. Also, it was noted that All Saints is looking for additional board members, and it is hoped that someone from our church will be on the board. There was a lot of discussion about All Saints camp.
