Setbacks can be painful

from the Deacon

I spent a lot time lying in the bed last week, we had just returned from Vanderbilt University Hospital. They did alot of labs, trying to find out why my red blood cells were dropping so fast. They had increased my Idhifa (the chemo pill) to 100 mg on Friday before Palm Sunday. Holy week was a huge challenge for me. I managed to do the Maundy Thursday service and Good Friday I did the last Stations of the Cross, with Marty and Miranda.

During Holy week I met with the Bishop, I attended the Chrism Mass there at All Saints Camp. I managed to ride down with Fr. David Carletta the Rector at Trinity Episcopal Church in Owensboro. My meeting with the Bishop was very fruitful. The Bishop and I walked among the clergy asking who was available to serve at St. Paul's on Easter Sunday. That's when we came upon Fr. Bill Parker, who graciously accepted our invitation. The Bishop and I thanked Fr. Bill for helping St. Paul's on Easter Sunday. I received plenty of hugs that day along with prayers, love and peace. It was wonderful being with my fellow Clergy. We had lunch from twelve to 1:00 pm which is always delicious!

The Clergy started vesting at 1:15. The Bishop blessed us with a great sermon, afterwards we had communion with our Bishop. We finished the service with Archdeacon's dismissal. I arrived home at 4:00pm with plenty of time to eat supper and get ready for Maundy Service.

Saturday morning I had to be at the Church to unlock the doors, the lilies were being delivered for Easter Sunday. It turned out to be a long day, getting the Altar setup, cleaning the brass and changing to the color white. By the time I returned home I was totally fatigued. Michael ordered carryout from Cracker Barrel for our supper.

Easter morning I had fatigue really bad. But I was determined to serve along side Fr. Bill Parker at the Easter service. I thought the service went very well. Michael and I stayed after the service to enjoy Connie's Easter Brunch. We had to come home, pack our overnight bags, I had an appointment first thing Monday morning at the stem cell clinic at Vanderbilt. I complained about the fatigue I was having. But was told my body was adjusting to the increased Idhifa.

We came home, that evening I was in bed and I was unable to function the rest of the week. Each day worse than the day before. Friday I had a fever of 101.2, it was time to go to the ER! I had to be transferred by ambulance to Vanderbilt. I spent the next four days in hospital while tests were being done. I watched the Baptism on tablet. Bless you all for your prayers and cards of love and support.


No Camp disappointing for our Youth.
